

Vesak Day (Wesak or Buddha Day)



Here are a few meaningful facts about Vesak Day that highlight why it holds such importance for millions around the world:

- **Triple Celebration:** Vesak commemorates the birth, enlightenment, and passing (parinirvana) of Gautama Buddha—all believed to have occurred on the same day of the year.
- **Buddhists typically celebrate** by visiting temples, and chanting and singing hymns which praise the 3 jewels, the central pillars of the Buddhist faith; the Buddha (the Teacher), the Dharma (the Teachings) and the Sangha (the Community of Buddhist practitioners)
- **Global Observance:** Vesak is celebrated in many countries with Buddhist communities, including Sri Lanka, Thailand, Nepal, India, Malaysia, Indonesia, Myanmar, and the UK.
- **Date Varies Each Year:** The date of Vesak is based on the lunar calendar, usually falling in May, or early June if there's a leap year.
- **United Nations Recognition:** In 1999, the United Nations officially recognised Vesak Day as an international day of observance.
- **Traditions Include:**
 - Visiting temples
 - Offering food and donations to monks and those in need
 - Lighting lanterns or candles
 - Releasing animals as a symbol of liberation
 - Meditating and reading Buddhist scriptures
- **Focus on Compassion:** Vesak is not just a religious event—it encourages acts of kindness, generosity, and reflection on how to live peacefully and mindfully.
